

No sir, what I want to talk to you about is the TVMC Officer elections which occur every year. Now is the time to get serious about electing new officers to lead our motley crew of Moparite's into the next year. According to our By-Laws we elect club officers in September every year. So, now is the time to consider who you would like to see in the leadership jobs. PRODUCT REPORTS

What it is: Poly Loc engine mounts. Unlike OEM engine mounts which can debond and pull apart, they have an internal lock which prevents them from pulling apart due to engine torque

Where you can get it: Schumacher Creative Services They have a full page ad every month in Mopar Muscle

How much do they cost? \$150 a pair plus \$10 shipping

How do you use them? They look like OEM engine mounts and bolt in like OEM mounts. Difficulty of installation is low to moderate, depending on the engine, body, manifolds and accessories which may restrict access to the engine side of the mounts.

How well do they work? Due to the internal metal lock, they will absolutely, positively hold the engine securely on its mounting pads.

What they don't tell you: The Poly Locs are much stiffer than OEM mounts. In my installation, this caused an unpleasant vibration in the 600 - 700 RPM range. I retuned the engine for a smoother idle to reduce the noise of idling in gear (automatic). Also, the Poly Locs are 3/8 inch taller than the OEM mounts, so I had to pull the radiator and relocate the shroud brackets to regain clearance between the fan and the shroud.

Overall evaluation: These are essential if you want to keep the engine securely planted with an original look. After having an almost new engine mount pull apart in my 72 Satellite, I wouldn't run a big block without them.

What it is: Eastwood gas tank sealer kit

Where you can get it: Eastwood

How much does it cost? \$40 for the kit, plus \$10 shipping, plus about \$20 for muriatic and acetone procured from a home supply store like Lowe's or Home Depot

How do you use it? The process isn't hard, after you remove the tank from the car, but it's time consuming. To make a long story short, it goes like this.

- a. Rinse the tank with soapy water.
- b. Rinse the tank again with soapy water.
- c. Mix the metal cleaner and slosh it in the tank, then allow the tank to rest on each side for 10 minutes.
- d. Mix some muriatic acid and slosh it in the tank and rest the tank on each side for 5-10 minutes.
- e. Repeat the muriatic acid wash until the interior surface looks metallic instead of rusty. My rusty tank took 3 runs with the acid to start looking pretty good.
- f. Put the etching primer in the tank, slosh and rest the tank on each side for 5-10 minutes. (If you add up all the minutes, you'll see this is taking a lot of minutes.)
- g. Put a quart of acetone in the tank and slosh thoroughly.
- h. Repeat g with another quart of acetone
- I. Put the sealer in the tank and roll the tank all around to distribute the sealer on all surfaces. Wait a few minutes and repeat.
- j. Cure the tank for 48 hours with a small stream of air blowing through the tank.

How well does it work? After 2 days curing in the hot sun, the sealer has formed a very tough surface inside the tank. Only time will tell how the sealer adheres to the interior of

the tank. The process did produce a surprisingly clean metal surface for the sealer application. However, I observed that the muriatic acid was the most effective rust remover, so if you just want to get the rust out of a tank, you might just use the muriatic and acetone to get a reasonably clean surface.

Overall evaluation: This is the way to go if you need to restore a tank that can't be replaced, or if your tank is solid with only surface rust. Considering the cost and time involved, I wouldn't recommend it to try to salvage a tank with leaks due to rust, if the tank could be replaced.
